The Nottawa Community School District literacy plan to target identified focus areas to address gaps in literacy practices is to work within the district's MTSS to provide responsive tiered interventions to students with mindfulness to new and emergent readers, MultiLingual Learners (especially those identified by WIDA), 31a identified at risk pupils specifically tiers 2 and 3 with mindfulness to prevent an imbalance in tier 3. Read By Grade Three Law is a significant consideration in the district's comprehensive screening process.

District assessments and screeners identified gaps in language comprehension, word recognition, and phonemic awareness. We anticipate the LETRS professional development will equip teachers with the knowledge and skill to close these gaps for students. Teachers will be able to better interpret data from the following district assessments and screeners: My

View Acadience, DRA, and IXL. LETRS training will improve our professional ability to diagnose difficulties (i.e. gaps) and accelerate student learning.

Nottawa will allocate grant funds to purchase supplemental curricular and instructional materials and engage in professional development around high-quality instructional practices.

In reviewing data, we also realized that abundant reading materials were lacking in many classrooms. We would allocate remaining grant funds to purchase materials for diverse classroom libraries.

We believe that by improving our tier one core instruction along with improving knowledge and increasing access to abundant reading materials in classrooms for students, that literacy proficiency will improve, and we will reduce imbalances in tiers 2 and 3.
